

Lab Dress Picture explained in words.

The previous link was a picture of how students should dress for laboratory activities; this link is the accompanying text version.

The picture is a cartoon of one female student who is appropriately dressed for lab. The picture depicts a female student with long hair in a pony tail because

- Long hair must always be tied back.
- Jewelry that is long enough to swing away from the body is not allowed. This applies to any sort of jewelry including earrings, necklace, and bracelets.
- The student is wearing a short-sleeved shirt with a crew neck. The upper body, except for the arms and face must be completely covered.
- Goggles or Safety Glasses, which protect the eyes, must be worn at all times while lab is in session.

Regarding shirts: low-cut scoop or low-cut V-necks are not allowed, spaghetti- straps are not allowed, plunging neck-lines of any kind are not allowed. The bottom of the shirt must be at least six inches below the top of the pants. This allows a student to stretch or bend and no skin will be showing.

- The pants are straight-legged and connect with the tops of the sneakers that the student is wearing.
- Cropped pants are not allowed.
- Long skirts that cover the legs completely are allowed. Skirts with slits are not allowed.
- The ankles should be covered as spills often occur at ankle-level. Nylons are not allowed, socks are allowed.
- Open-toed shoes are not allowed; only closed-toe shoes are allowed.
